Course Description:

This course is designed to provide advanced training for giving medical care to patients in the pre-hospital setting. The course will offer instruction and practical experience for students to develop the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed for certification and practice as an Advance Emergency Medical Technician- (AEMT) in Kansas.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Use knowledge of human anatomy and physiology to explain the rationale and fundamentals of pre-hospital care and treatment of the sick and injured.
- 2. Perform a complete and accurate advanced patient assessment.
- 3. Provide appropriate care for both life-threatening and non-life-threatening emergencies.
- 4. Demonstrate correct application and use of advanced airway and intravenous equipment in the pre-hospital setting.
- 5. Complete a written record of events for the use of the receiving hospital as well as a permanent record for local use.
- 6. Use mobile radio equipment to transmit necessary information in a clear, orderly manner from the scene or ambulance to the receiving facility.
- 7. Explain the rationale and procedure for personal and patient safety and care at the scene and throughout transport to a receiving facility.
- 8. Explain the rationale and procedure for infection control during and after any contact with a patient.

This course provides advanced instruction in content material covered 109-11-4a advanced emergency medical technician (AEMT) course approval by the state of Kansas AEMT.

Course Content:

The AEMT Instructional Guidelines in this section include all the topics and material at the EMT-B level PLUS the following material:

- A. Safety/well-being of the AEMT, medical/legal and ethical issues
- B. Airway, respiratory and circulatory systems assessment management in EMS
- C. Medical terms and abbreviations in written and oral communication
- D. Life span development related to patient assessment and management.
- E. Role of EMS during public health emergencies.
- F. Medications used by AEMTs that may be administered to a patient during an emergency.
- G. Scene size-up, primary and secondary assessment
- H. Advanced emergency care and transportation based on assessment findings
- I. Roles and responsibilities to ensure patient, public, and personnel safety

Learning Assessments:

Course competencies will be assessed by written homework assignments, written examinations, laboratory skills scenarios, practical skills exams, and clinical performance.
