Course Description:

This course provides a survey of the significant writers, works, and developments in British literature from the Middle Ages through the Eighteenth Century.

Course Competencies:

- 3. Identify the various genres of British literature.
- 4. Identify the major writers and works of British literature of the period.
- 5. Explain the unique significance of British literature of the period.
- 6. Write and revise papers with page format and source documentation in the MLA style.

- B. The Sixteenth Century (1485-1603)
- C. The Seventeenth Century (1603-1660)
- D. The Restoration and Eighteenth Century (1660-1798)
