Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to study and practice the techniques of effective oral reading and performance. The focus will be on the careful reading, analysis, discussion, rehearsal, and performance of selections taken from various forms of literature, including poetry, essay, novel, short story, and drama.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Use voice qualities, facial expressions, and body movements to enhance the effectiveness of reading aloud from various works of literature.
- 2. Explain and demonstrate how pitch, tone, intensity, phrasing, pauses, enunciation, and rhythm affect listener comprehension and appreciation.
- 3. Use reading skills and critical analysis to understand meanings of written works.
- 4. Use presentation and performance techniques to interpret and provide understanding of selections from works of literature for an audience.
- 5. Interpret literary works with accuracy and integrity for a listening audience.
- 6. Use effective listening skills to respond to other presenters or performers.
- 7. Offer honest, thoughtful, well-intentioned, and constructive criticism of others.
- 8. Receive and respond to constructive criticism with respect, thoughtfulness, and maturity.
