A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT DAVID REIST



Twice each year, the College does a box holder mailing of a promotional, informational piece to the areas we serve and/or draw students. It's colorful, well done, and provides a lot of information about the College, our courses and programs, and our locations and delivery methods. Even in this age of electronic information, prospective students tell us they still use this printed piece to make decisions about courses, programs, and locations they will use to take classes from us. At some point in the future, I assume this printed piece will be obsolete, but when we chose to forgo printing this item a few semesters ago, our enrollment took a significant drop, so we made a decision to continue printing it.

We receive many good comments each year on this piece, we refer to the "course guide", a guide to help area residents select courses. Folks, who have no intention of enrolling in college classes enjoy the piece and thank us for keeping them informed on the all of the things the College is doing. And, the course guide spurs several questions. I'll attempt to answer some of those for you.

Why does Highland Community College teach classes at multiple locations? HCC has been assigned a service area in northeast Kansas that includes all of seven counties (Doniphan, Atchison, Brown, Jackson, Jefferson, Nemaha, and Marshall) and parts of two counties (the north half of Wabaunsee and the eastern part of Pottawatomie). The Kansas Board of Regents expects HCC to serve the educational needs of the people in those counties. Accessibility is one of the trademarks of a community college, so we take our courses and programs on the road, so to speak, to be more accessible to the people in our service area.

What does Highland do at all of its regional locations?

In addition to the campus in Highland, we have five regional sites: **Perry** – Our location in Perry serves Jefferson County, NW Lawrence, and NE Topeka. In addition to teaching our general education courses, Perry is the headquarters of our Early Childhood program, and we also do Power Safe Training for Westar Energy employees.

Technical Center (Atchison) – The HCC Technical Center in Atchison came about from a merger of Northeast Kansas Technical College and HCC in July of 2008. Although we do offer general education courses, most of the offerings are technical courses and programs.

About half of the students at the Technical Center are high school students

Holton - The Holton Center serves North Topeka, Jackson County, and the Holton, Royal Valley, and Jackson Heights School Districts. It's also serves as our Headquarters for E-Learning (on-line courses).

Wamego – The Wamego Center serves Wamego, Manhattan, and Eastern Pottawatomie County. In addition to all of our general education courses, Wamego serves as the headquarters of our Viticulture and Enology programs and we offer Precision Agriculture there as well.

Western Center (Baileyville) – the HCC Western Center is our newest location and plugs a previous hole in the northwest section of our service area. Most of our enrollment in Baileyville is high school students enrolling through the Excel in Technical Education Initiative, but the programs and courses are open to anyone. HCC offers Construction Tech, Diesel Tech, Industrial Welding, Medical Office Assistant, and Precision Agriculture at the Western Center in addition to general education courses for Nemaha and Marshall Counties.

What are concurrent classes? Concurrent classes are college classes that are offered in the high schools in our service area during the regular high school day for both college and high school credit. These classes allow qualifying high school students to get a head start on their college education by taking courses like College English, General Psychology, College Algebra. HCC offer concurrent classes at over 30 high schools in our service area.

What does HCC offer online? Realistically, almost all of our academic courses can be taken online. Students can earn our Associate Degrees (AA, AS. AAS) all online. HCC also offers specific program degrees in Accounting, Business Administration, Medical Coding, Risk Management, Personal Fitness Training

How many students does HCC enroll in a semester?

Highland Community College has been averaging about 3,400 students per semester. We've reached a high of 3,850 and enroll over 5,000 students annually (unduplicated headcount for summer, fall, and spring semesters).

Does HCC do any specialized Training? Specialized Training and course work (either credit or noncredit) is available on request. HCC has recently offered training for businesses and other groups in areas like OSHA, computer courses, accounting, continuing education hours in Master and Journeyman electricians, and CNC machining. Some of this training takes place on our campuses or could be completed at the local businesses.

I hope you'll agree HCC does a great job of meeting our Mission and Vision Statements. The HCC Board of Trustees, Administration, and Strategic Planning Council annually review, with input from our HCC Foundation and Alumni Boards, the Highland Community College Mission, Vision, and Strategic Plan. The Mission and Vision are:

Notable Retirements



Bob Brainerd, Linda Collins, Dr. Cheryl Rasmussen, Peggy Forsberg

As the academic year came to an end, two administrators and two faculty members announced their retirements: Bob Brainerd, who taught sociology, physical sciences instructor Linda Collins. Peggy Forsberg, VP for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Cheryl Rasmussen, VP for Student Services.

Brainerd is a 1973 graduate of the College before completing his BSE at Missouri Western State University. He holds a master's degree in Clinical Social Work from the University of Kansas. Brainerd taught music at area high schools before returning to be a

music instructor for the College, noted for his percussion ensembles. After getting his master's degree, he worked for the Veteran's Hospital at Leavenworth, Family Guidance Center in St. Joseph, MO, and BreakThrough Consulting in St. Joseph. He then returned to the College to teach sociology, where he was noted for his large classes and his experiential student trips that provided students the opportunity to experience different cultures.

Collins came to the College after a career teaching middle school science for the Highland school district. A native of Highland, she completed coursework at the College before transferring to the University of Kansas where she earned her BSE in Science. She holds a master's degree in Classroom Technology from Kansas State University. Students in her classroom appreciated the use of technology and the opportunity to learn about science with a hands-on approach from an engaged instructor.

Forsberg's career at the College was split into two segments with service elsewhere in between. The first part of her Highland career was spent with the College's regional centers – as Assistant Dean for Regional Instruction and as the Site Coordinator for the College's Centers at Wamego and Perry. After serving as the Dean of Instruction at Independence Community College, the College was eager to get her back, so she returned to HCC, first at our regional center at Holton, before becoming the Interim VP for Academic Affairs and then the Vice President for Academic Affairs, where she created a climate of trust with the faculty and innovation in the classroom. She instituted a highly successful academic program review process, an evaluation system for adjunct faculty using technology, and was a key contributor to the College's accreditation process. A native of Gypsum, Forsberg attended Bethany College before completing her bachelor's degree in psychology at the University of Kansas. She also holds a master's degree in public administration from KU.

Rasmussen is a native of Lincoln, KS, she graduated from Bethany College. With a bachelor's degree in vocal music education and earned a master's degree in educational administration from KU. Rasmussen also received district certification from Emporia State University. Following a music teaching and then administrative career at the Highland school district, Rasmussen was hired as the Vice President of Student Services in 2002 to succeed David Reist, who was hired as President of the College. While at the College, she completed an Ed.D. in educational administration. As Student Services Vice President, she led many successful innovations, including Student Life, CARE Team, Title IX procedures, student services at the College's regional centers, IT enhancements, responsibility for the regional centers, and advising. In addition, she wrote a successful Title III grant that helped create HCC's Western Center at Baileyville and contributed to the College's accreditation processes documents.

HCC Student Wins International PTK Award and Office

Obinna Muoh, a current student at HCC from Cotonou, Benin Republic, was named the winner of the Orlowski Award, the person who best exemplifies Phi Theta Kappa. He was then elected to a vice-presidential office within PTK at the International Convention that took place this spring. Also, Highland President David Reist received the Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction for his outstanding efforts of supporting PTK goals.

HCC Personnel Present at National Conference

As part of its process for evaluating instructors at Highland, academic administrators use a technology system that provides the instructor and evaluator with ready data for improvement. Dr. Cheryl Rasmussen, prior VP for Student Services at the College, explored ways that technology could be useful in student affairs, particularly for documenting student service processes in the College's accreditation work.

One result of that exploration is a partnership between HCC Student Services and Southwest Plains Regional Service Center that resulted in recognition by NASPA, a nationally-affiliated organization made up of student affairs administrators in higher education. The combined efforts of HCC and Southwest Plains developed a customized, digital observation process for recognizing quality service in an educational setting and continues to generate interest across the region.

Volunteers Create New Highland Practice Fields

In previous years, Highland athletics had been renting farm ground for its football team to use as a practice field. This past year, the decision was made to use a portion of its own farm ground that is contiguous to the campus. The ground was not level, and it was going to be expensive to move the amount of dirt necessary to level the area. That was when volunteers came to the rescue. A group of local farmers and businessmen came together under the leadership of Rocky Ruhnke to survey the property, loan the necessary equipment, and provide the labor needed to level a portion of the field that sits adjacent to the Highland Community Center, just to the south of the water tower. In addition to Ruhnke, his dad Jim, Scott Twombly, Jason Taylor, Emmet Cole, and John and Grant Gladhart. Eric Cole, Brad Haynes, David Keys, Maurice Kleppe, Justin Tilton, Shawn Tilton, and Rodger Vanderslice pitched in provide the needed machines and labor. President David Reist was very appreciative of the group effort to get this work done.

Highland Campus Library Dedicates a Room

HCC dedicated a room in its Library to Brenda Hines, who retired last year after teaching at the College for 46 years. Brenda first taught in Santa Ana, CA. She accepted a position at HCC in the fall of 1969, teaching English. During her tenure at the College, she also taught World Literature, American Literature, Philosophy, and

Ethics. She worked under seven College presidents and recalls the days when there was only one women's dormitory, Corder Hall, and one men's dormitory. There were only four buildings on campus when she first arrived. Hines ended her teaching career in the spring of 2015, after 46 years.



Highland Alum Part of Patriots' Super Bowl Victory

Former Highland Community College standout Brandon King won a World Championship. The 2013 Highland graduate from Alabaster, AL, in just his second NFL season, has reached the pinnacle of American football and won a Super Bowl. King was signed to the Patriots practice squad in September of 2015. In October of 2015, King was added to the 53-man roster. King is the first Highland alum to win a Super Bowl. King played two seasons at HCC from 2011-2012. After Highland, King transferred to Auburn University and finished out his final two seasons as a linebacker for the Tigers. He majored in Public Administration.

Highland to Expand Diesel Facilities at Western Center in Baileyville

To accommodate the growing needs of enrollment in the Diesel Program at HCC's Western Center in Baileyville, the College Board of Trustees approved the renovation of the second gymnasium in the former B&B High School facility into an enhanced Diesel facility. Diesel was the number one program requested by the high schools, students, parents, and local businesses when the College first did community surveys as it was considering developing the Western Center. The new space will be available for classes beginning this fall.

Softball Alums Now Playing in Czech Republic

Former Scottie softball players Allyne Clark and Paige Crawford, both from the class of 2014, signed professional contracts and are now playing softball in Prague. They play for the SaBaT Praha baseball/softball organization. The organization has multiple levels of teams for both baseball and softball. Clark and Crawford play on the highest-level team that participates in the Czech Extraleague.

Peuker Plaza Taking Shape on Highland Campus

The development work of President David Reist and Lisa Ward, an attorney on the HCC Foundation Board of Directors, has resulted in the creation of Peuker Plaza on the Highland



campus. Peuker Plaza is located to the north of the Communications Technology building and adjacent to campus housing complexes.

Peuker Plaza is being created in memory of Myrtle Peuker whose family home was located on the site where the Plaza is being created. Work on the Plaza is funded completely with a gift from Peuker's daughter, Janet Spangler, who wanted to create a memorial to her mother. The Plaza will be an open air venue for music, theatre, and other performances at the College. It will include a stage complete with lighting and sound in the northwest corner facing to the southeast. Natural seating areas will be created, along with an open area which could include either more seating or sitting on the grass. It is anticipated that work on Peuker Plaza will be complete in time for the Fall semester.

Technical Student Receives Award at SkillsUSA

Justin Deeken, a student of the HCC Technical Center, was awarded second place in the high school division of Electrical Construction Wiring at the annual SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Championship Conference. The competition was held in Louisville. All winners receive medals and frequently receive tools of their trade and/or scholarships to further their careers and education.

A New President's Staff Takes Shape

The College experienced significant turnover in its Vice President positions during the year as three of the four vice presidents retired. Vice President for Finance and Operations Dan Erbert retired in December and Vice President for Academic Affairs Peggy Forsberg and Vice President for Student Services Dr. Cheryl Rasmussen both retired in June. Randy Willy came on board in late May to replace Erbert; Dr. Erin Shaw, who had been serving as the Perry Center Director, assumed the Academic Affairs position; and Eric Ingmire joined the College in July as Rasmussen's replacement.

Eric Ingmire, Vice President for Student Services came to the College from the Fremont campus of Pueblo Community College where he was the Director of Student Services. A native Kansan, Ingmire graduated from Berean Academy in Elbing, Manhattan Christian College with a bachelor's degree, Kansas State University with a master's degree in Counseling and Student Development, and is completing a doctorate from Grand Canyon University in Organizational Leadership.

In addition to his role at Pueblo, Ingmire served as Director of Admissions at his alma mater, Manhattan Christian College, where he was also the soccer coach for the NCCAA DII National Champions. He is a member of NACEP, NACADA, and is a trained and experienced Title IX Investigator. He is Board member for Boy and Girls Club, the Community Relations Board for the Federal Bureau of Prisons, and Chair of the Rotary Leadership Academy.

Dr. Erin Shaw, Vice President for Academic Affairs originally came to the College in October 2014, as the Director of the Perry Center, from Truman State University in Missouri where she was an academic advisor. She held previous positions at the University of Oklahoma, Covenant House Alaska, and Prince William Sound Community College. Shaw was born in Colby, Kansas, and grew up in Lawrence before attending high school in Alaska. During high school, she earned concurrent credit at Matanuska-Susitna College and the University of Alaska-Anchorage. After high school, she attended the University of Oklahoma where she received her BA in Journalism-Public Relations. Shaw returned to Alaska for three more years to work in PR and marketing at which time she dabbled in nine college hours toward an MBA at the University of Alaska-Anchorage.

Ultimately working in higher education enticed Shaw back to the University of Oklahoma, where she earned her M.Ed. in Adult and Higher Education. Then, while working full-time at Truman State, she completed a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership and Policy Analysis

- Higher Education Administration at the University of Missouri-Columbia. Her dissertation titled, Sense Making for Community College Transfers Entering a Public, Liberal Arts University won the 2015 Barbara K. Townsend Dissertation Award. Her research will be included as a chapter in Transition and Transformation: New Research Fostering Transfer Student Success due to be published later in 2017 by the University of North Georgia Press.

Shaw was a member of the 2016-2017 Kansas Community College Leadership Institute sponsored by the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees.

Randy Willy, Vice President for Finance and Operations

Randy Willy joined the College in May 2017 as the Vice President for Finance and Operations. He previously served as the Vice President of Finance for Vancouver Career Colleges, which is the largest career college provider in Canada with thirty seven locations throughout the country. He has worked in higher education for over twenty years and has held senior financial leadership positions with Ellis University, Grantham University, and Concorde Career Colleges.

Randy is a native of Bay City, Michigan. After graduating from Bay City Central High School, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps and served for four years. For the majority of his enlistment, he was stationed in Yuma, Arizona and attended his first community college class at Arizona Western State College. 

Gormley came to the College from the old Midway High School in Denton. While here, he lettered both years in basketball and track, helping win Interstate Conference titles in both each year. His basketball teams had 21-1 and 24-3 records. He was the track captain as a sophomore when he won the High Point trophy at the Highland Relays, winning the 200, 400, and high hurdles and third in the high jump



McClung is a native of Wetmore. As a Scottie, she ran cross country,

indoor/outdoor track, and the marathon. She was part of a third-place team finish in the 1993 national Cross-Country Meet and a second-place team finish at the National Marathon Meet the following spring. Individually, she was crowned the 1994 NJCAA Marathon Women's Champion. For her work in the classroom, she was recognized as a Distinguished Academic All-American.



Tracy probably "touched" more student athletes than anyone else in the history of the College as she was the administrative assistant for three Athletic Directors over 36 years. Tracy previously held other positions at the College, accounting for 48 years of service at HCC. HIGHLAND ATHLETICS RECAP

FOOTBALL

The 2016 Highland football season will be one to remember. For Coach Aaron Arnold's Sctotties, 2016 was a year full of record-breaking performances and a number of firsts in HCC history. Highland went 7-4 on the year and a perfect 5-0 at home; the most wins in



a season for the Scotties in over 20 years. That record helped boost them to number 17 in the final NJCAA National Poll, again, the highest NJCAA finish in program history. The Scotties finished second in the KJCC Conference, right behind the number one team in the nation, Garden City, a team HCC lost to by six in week two of the season. This is the fourth year in a row Highland has finished in the top half of the KJCCC. The team placed 11 players on the KJCCC All-Conference Teams. Those on the First Team were KJCCC Offensive Player of the Year running back Marquis Terry (Atlanta, GA), sophomore wide-receiver Demarre Kitt (Atlanta, GA), and freshman offensive lineman Torrey Boone (Blythewood, SC). In



addition to the accomplishments of this year's Scotties, Scottie alum Jake Swalley ('14), a senior middle guard for Arkansas State, was a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy from the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame.

VOLLEYBALL



HCC sophomores Tyrecia Lukes (Homestead, FL) and Shailey Caudle (Atchison), and freshman Leslie Polanco (Dominican Republic) were named to the Jayhawk All-Conference and NJCAA All-Region VI volleyball teams. Lukes finished with well-earned

First Team All-KJCCC and First Team NJCAA Region VI District M honors. Under HCC head coach Jon Bingesser's mentorship, a total of five Scotties earned All-KJCCC and All-Region recognition, including one First Team All-Conference, two Second Team All-Conference, two Honorable Mention All-Conference, two First Team All-Region, and three Second Team All-Region. This is the first time since 2010 that HCC had three players on the All-Region VI roster. This 2016 season, the Scotties finished 8-2 on their home court; 16 of their 24 wins were done in three straight sets, and finished 24-14 on the season; the first 20+ wins in a season since 2011.

CROSS COUNTRY

The men's cross country team had a strong 15th place finish out of 65 teams at the NJCAA National Tournament. Jose Jaime (McAllen, TX) finished first of the HCC team and 40th overall, running a 26:24.48. Jorge Guerrero (San Antonio, TX) came up 86th with a time of 27:19.63. Zekarias Philipo (Houston, TX) and John Brunner (Elbing) both finished within the 27 minutes and teammates Jordan Adams (Princeton, MO), Isaiah Smith (Houston, TX), and Cole Hinton (Wathena) finished within the 28th minute. The team's 15th place finish was the third top 20 finish in the last four years for the men's team under Head Coach Chad Clevenger, and the second highest finish ever (14th in 2014).

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Befitting a team that won the Division II title for the first time, the Scotties dominated the KJCC All-Conference Team selections. The Scottie men swept the top three awards this year: Coach, Most Valuable Player, and Freshman of the Year with Coach Jerre Cole ('91) and Stephon Jackson who took both MVP



and Freshman of the Year. Alum Martell Collins ('14) signed with a German professional team to continue his career in Europe.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The Scottie women continued their winning ways from previous



seasons under Coach BJ Smith, finishing second in Division II. Mariane Carvalho (Brazil) was Jayhawk Freshman of the Year. She is joined by sophomore teammates Jameka Dowell (Lebanon, TN) and Szonja Vukov (Hungary) on the All-Conference First Team. During the

season, Smith, in just his sixth year at the College, became the winningest coach in Highland women's basketball history with win number 150. He surpassed long time coach Marty Allen ('78) for most wins.

BASEBALL

The College reached into the NCAA Division I ranks to recall one of its own to become the new head baseball coach for the Scotties. Daniel Dulin ('04), who played second base for the Scotties in 2003-04, was the assistant coach for Murray State University prior to

accepting the Highland helm. Dulin, a native of Lawrence, is familiar with the Jayhawk Conference not only from his playing days, but also from coaching stints at Coffeyville and Hutchinson. Dulin completed his bachelor's degree at Fort Hays State and his master's degree at Pittsburg State University. In his first



season, three baseball sophomore leaders earned All-Conference honors after their 18-36 season. Mitchell Austin (Sydney, Australia), Wyatt Nowack (Kearney, MO), and Stachys McCloud (Overland Park) earned All-Conference Honorable Mention honors.

SOFTBALL

The softball team finished third in the KJCCC East with a 35-12 record and a 16-8 Conference record. The team led the Conference in homeruns with 55, 25 more than the second place team, and finished tied for first in RBI's with 360. They led in runs scored



with 399 this season. The Scotties' hitting percentage of .381 and on-base percentage of .441 both were second in the Conference; HCC's slugging percentage was first at .594. The Highland pitchers finished with some of the top stats in the Conference as well, allowing only 114 hits on the

year, striking out 207 batters, and a pitching ERA of 2.71; third best in the KJCCC East. There were a total of seven Scotties who earned a post-season honor this year. During the season, Head Coach Heidi Jordan and Associate Head Coach Scott Jordan recorded win number 450 at Highland.

TRACK AND FIELD

Kyelah Hodges, a sophomore (Monticello, AR) finished in 2nd place in the 600 meter run at the NJCAA Indoor National Championships. Hodges ran a time of 1:30.59, breaking her own HCC record and



crushing the facility record of 1:34.43 at Pitt State University. The women's 4x800 meter relay team held the fastest time in the nation by a margin of three seconds after running a 9:10.58, bringing home 1st Place in the KJCCC/Region VI and crushing the 15-year old HCC record by 70 seconds. The Scotties finished the race 80 meters ahead of the 2nd place finishers. The 4x800 team was made up of sophomore Alison Nutt (New London,

TX), freshman Coshan Campbell (Bahamas),

freshman Kira Williams (Topeka), and sophomore Kyelah Hodges (Monticello, AR). Each received All-Conference and All-Region honors for their 1st place victory. After an already record-setting career, Kyelah Hodges added yet another accolade to the list as she earned U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association 'National Athlete of the Week' honors.

Athletics at Highland have a proud tradition of providing opportunities for students to grow and develop on and off the field. We are dedicated to enhancing the overall experience for student-athletes and fans by continuously improving facilities.

It is in this spirit that we are embarking on a transformational project to install synthetic turf on the football field. The new turf will enable all our sports teams, and local teams, to utilize the field more often, and we will be able to use it for various purposes and events in all weather conditions with reduced maintenance responsibilities.

"Football was forced to practice indoors 40% of the time due to the condition of the game field. If we had the turf field, the team would have had to practice inside twice," Head Coach Aaron Arnold said. "The athletic facilities have not had a major renovation since 2011".

In 2016 Highland football team went 7-4 and had a perfect 5-0 record at home; the most wins in a season for the Scotties in over 20 years! That record helped boost them to number 14 in the NJCAA National Poll, again, the highest NJCAA ranking in program history. The Scotties finished second in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference, right behind the number one team in the nation, Garden City; a team HCC lost to by only six points in week two of the season.

OUR VISION, FOR VITICULTURE & ENOLOGY

In the Fall 2010, Highland Community College began offering Associate in Science and Technical Certificate programs in both Viticulture and Enology in Wamego, to serve the burgeoning winemaking and grape growing industry in Kansas. There were twelve wineries in Kansas at that time and today there are almost 40. Nearly all of the new winery owner/operators have either taken classes or attended workshops hosted by Highland Viticulture & Enology.

In these seven years, Highland has educated over one-hundred seventeen wine industry entrepreneurs and enthusiasts and has developed four local vineyards with over 5200 vines. The Highland Viticulture & Enology Program has quickly become recognized for winemaking in Kansas, winning Best in Show with a wine called Chambourcin Reserve in January 2014 at the Kansas Grape Growers and Wine Makers Association Conference.

Members of the program staff have been recognized as the source of vineyard and winery knowledge in Kansas. Our efforts have accelerated the growth of the grape and wine industry in the state. HCC has assisted in the planting of over 20,000 grape vines in the past three years. The Kansas wine industry is growing. According to the U.S. Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau, the number of gallons of still wines produced in Kansas grew from 62,583 in 2007 to 85,038 in 2015, a 36% increase.

Each acre of grapes planted creates the equivalent of 2.2 jobs in Kansas through industry related activities such as tourism and farm labor. An existing winery building adjacent to our Wamego campus was purchased in 2016 to expand into a larger lab, processing, and teaching space. This building will allow the Highland program to accommodate growing enrollment, and the development of a Wine Business Incubator program within this new winery space.

The Wine Business Incubator in Wamego will be the first of its kind east of the Rockies. It will allow up to five start-up wineries in this new building along with the existing HCC Winery. It will include a shared set of winemaking equipment such as pumps, filters, and bottling line. To create this incubator, the production area requires the construction of cubical walls, floor treatments, and electrical reconfiguration. The tasting room and sales area needs renovation, and the outdoor picnic area and office space need to be built.

"To open a winery on your own, you're looking at well into the six figures to get the building, buy the equipment, and do the marketing. What we will do is create something no different than any other business incubator, but instead of offices with internet, we have rooms full of wine tanks and a shared tasting and sales area."

With your help Highland Community College can be a central force to help grow the wine economy of Kansas by providing a robust environment to teach the art, technical skills and the business of wine making which will enable more wineries to develop and generate revenue, tax, and employment.

Practical Nursing at the Highland Community College
Technical Center in Atchison is a nine-month course of study
that prepares students for employment as a Licensed Practical
Nurse. Students will obtain the knowledge, skills, and aptitudes
necessary to succeed in passing the National Licensure
Examination (NCLEX-PN) and secure employment at
hospitals, long-term care facilities, doctors' offices, correctional
facilities, and many more medical venues. Licensed Practical
Nurses work under the direction of Registered Nurses,
advanced practice personnel, and physicians. Many LPNs choose
to continue their education toward Registered Nurse (RN) at
Highland.

The LPN to RN Completion Program awards an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN). This is a two-semester program that allows Licensed Practical Nurses to "bridge" to the next level of nursing.

LPN graduates obtain the knowledge, skills, and abilities of the entry level registered nurse. Through a series of courses that build on the knowledge and experience of the LPN, the program encourages critical thinking skills, ethical principles, and legal practices of professional nursing established in the Kansas Nurse Practice Act. Successful completion of this program enables the graduate to take the national licensure examination (NCLEX-RN*) to become a Registered Nurse.

Highland's LPN to RN Completion Program was recognized by the Kansas State Board of Nursing Education as the only RN class of 2014 in the state of Kansas to achieve a 100% first time pass rate of the National Nursing Exam (NCLEX)! This is a very rare accomplishment and a credit to the program staff and students.

The nursing profession will be facing a "retirement tsunami" in the next five to ten years with the average age of nursing faculty at 60 and the average age of working nurses at 49. Nationally, jobs for registered nurses are expected to grow 19 percent over the next decade, faster than the average of all occupations, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The focus of nursing educators must be on:

- 1. Increasing the number of new nurses to replace nurses who will retire in the next ten years.
- 2. Increasing diversity of the student population to include more men and underrepresented racial and ethnic minority groups.
- 3. Preparing graduate nurses, RNs and LPNs, to provide quality patient-centered, evidenced-base care to vulnerable groups across the health care continuum. Intro Goals of the Nursing Simulation Center include:
- Provision of a non-threatening learning environment which allows students "to be the nurse".
- Filling gaps in clinical experience created by competition for clinical placements and limits imposed by clinical affiliates.
- Assisting students to suspend disbelief through the provision of active learning which is as true to life as possible using sophisticated, current technology which is industry-specific.
- Promotion of safe and effective clinical practice.
- Development of skills in clinical reasoning and decision-making.
- Allowing for practice in communication and collaboration as well as psychomotor skills.
- Evaluation of student development in professionalism.
- Promotion of a smooth transition to the workplace and seamless articulation to the next level of education.

The Vision for our Future Campaign will raise funds to purchase these necessary high tech items to ensure Highland's Nursing Program is robust, relevant and competitive to prepare nurses to provide quality patient centered care.



Ranked 7th out of 36 nursing schools in Kansas, the Highland nursing program has a historically high NCLEX-RN "pass rate" and was recently recognized by RegisteredNursing.org.
