Course Description:

This course covers basic parametric modeling. Working with CAD software students will work in three dimensions through shape description, sketching, and multi-view projection exercises. Students will work with mechanical drawings and specifications to assemble three-dimensional digital prototypes.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

1. Create a new drawing, setup, construct geometry, and control accuracy tools.
2. Create and edit 2D sketches and 3D geometry. Wireframe, solid models and assemblies.
3. Plot simple drawings on media using correct drafting standards and scale.
4. Produce introductory drawings using a variety of EG Software, CAD/Parametric modeling.
5. Apply materials and textures to 3D and parametric models.
6. Produce introductory level animations and/or simulations.
7. Utilize File, and Project Management.
8. Apply other media and software applications to CAD/Parametric files.

Course Content:

- A. Create
 1. Create wire frame and/or solid models
 2. Find intersection of two surfaces
 3. Create joined surfaces
 4. Create a fillet or blend between two surfaces
 5. Create feature-based geometry (e.g., holes, slots, and rounds)
 6. Create cut sections
 7. Construct and label exploded assembly drawings
 8. Perform Boolean operation (e.g., union, subtraction, intersection)
- B. Edit
 1. Trim surface
 2. Extend surface
 3. Edit control points
 4. Modify geometry via Boolean operations
 5. Edit primitives
- C. Manipulate
 1. Perform axis view clipping
 2. Extract wire frame data from surface/solid geometry
 3. Shade/render object (e.g., reflectivity, opacity)
- D. Software Productivity

1. Perform customization to improve productivity (e.g., customize menus, function keys, script file, macros)
2. Manipulate associated non-graphical data
3. Use template and library files to establish drawing standard presets
4. Develop geometry using parametric programs
5. Introduction to scanning 3D objects
6. Printing 3D objects
7. Produce and edit materials, textures, and lighting

Learning Assessments:

Competencies may be evaluated by multiple measures, including exams, papers, article reviews, research, experiments, and projects.
