Course Description:

This course provides a study of the structure of plants and how they live, grow, and reproduce. The course will emphasize function as a basis of life and how it is related to human problems such as population, food supply, and conservation.

Course Competencies:

- 2. List the characteristics of living organisms.
- 3. Explain the chemical and physical bases of life.
- 4. Describe the physiological function of the parts of a typical plant cell.
- 5. Describe the physiological function of plant tissues, roots, stems, leaves, flowers, fruits, and seeds.
- 6. Describe the basic processes of plant metabolism, reproduction, and growth.
- 7. State the basic concepts of plant genetics.
- 8. Describe the characteristics of representatives of the following kingdoms: Monera, Protista, Fungi, and Plantae.
- 9. Define and explain the basic terms and concepts associated with plant ecology.
