Course Description:

This course is a study of the exterior sheathings, windows, doors, siding, eave, and fascia. It includes installation, finish, and maintenance. The design style and installation of various types of windows and doors is covered. Experience in installing thresholds, weather stripping, lock-sets and overhead garaged doors is included.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Windows and Exterior Doors
 - a. Identify various types of fixed, sliding, and swinging windows.
 - b. Identify the parts of a window installation.
 - c. State the requirements for a proper window installation.
 - d. Install a pre-hung window.
 - e. Identify the common types of exterior doors and explain how they are constructed.
 - f. Identify the parts of a door installation.
 - g. Identify the types of thresholds used with exterior doors.
 - h. Install a pre-hung exterior door.
 - i. Identify the various types of locksets used on exterior doors and explain how they are installed.
 - j. Install a lockset.
- 2. Basic Stair Layout
 - a. Identify the various types of stairs.
 - b. Identify the various parts of stairs.
 - c. Identify the materials used in the construction of stairs.
 - d. Interpret construction drawings of stairs.
 - e. Calculate the total rise, number and size of risers, and number and size of treads required for a stairway.
 - f. Lay out and cut stringers, risers, and treads.
 - g. Build a small stair unit with a temporary handrail.
