# **Course Description:**

This course offers a basic study of American Sign Language (ASL), the language used by the deaf community in the United States. The course covers the fundamentals of ASL grammar, vocabulary, fingerspelling, numbers, visual-gestural communication, and information related to deaf culture.

- 1. Effectively use basic ASL communication, including sign vocabulary, fingerspelling, and numbers.
- 2. Effectively use expressive and receptive signing activities.
- 3. Summarize the history of American Sign Language.
- 4. Describe deaf culture and signing as an integral part of meaningful language.

#### Guidelines for Requesting Accommodations Based on Documented Disability or Medical Condition
