Course Description:

This course will examine the use and misuse of drugs and alcohol. The course will cover the biological and psychological effects of drug and alcohol use, the social and legal impact of substance abuse, and the challenges and issues faced by family members. Personal values and beliefs regarding substance use and misuse, current trends, and methods of prevention, intervention, and recovery will also be examined in this course.

Course Competencies:

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Summarize past and current social policies and legislation related to substance use.
- 2. Describe the social impact of substance use on families, society, and the health care system.
- 3. Describe how contributing factors and influences, such as genetics, family, environment, and culture play a role in substance use.
- 4. Describe the use, abuse, and treatment of stimulants, depressants, narcotics, marijuana, opioids, inhalants, and hallucinogens.
- 5. Identify the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5th Edition (DSM-5) criteria for substance abuse disorders.
- 6. Describe co-occurring mental health disorders and explain the risks associated with transient relief through substance use.
- 7. Describe and evaluate various prevention and recovery approaches.
