

# WRITING BLUES BY: JOY MEYER,

Do you often feel as though you are walking through a murky fog when writing an essay? Is it confusing or unclear what to write for a thesis statement or where to break your paragraphs? Are you questioning yourself on the quality of your paper? Do you fear each essay assignment? A common misunderstanding, especially among young writers, is that some people are naturally gifted writers, while others are not. This is often tied with a case of the "I can'ts". However, when following a basic set of guiding principles, anyone can learn to be a good writer. Even if you have struggled with the writing process in the past, you can learn to become a better writer, both in and out of school, by simply considering and applying a few fundamentals. Who knows? You may even learn to enjoy writing!

Below are a few tips to consider.

- Have something to say.
  - Read wisely and take notes
  - Narrow your topic from the given subject
- Be specific.
  - Use description
  - Paint a picture with sensory details
- Choose simple words.
  - Good writing is not always complex
  - Deliver the idea clearly
- Keep sentences short.
  - Easier on the reader's eyes
  - One simple thought is ample
  - Lengthy sentences can cause confusion
- Use active voice.
  - SVO...subject/verb/object
  - Passive voice can be boring
- · Keep paragraphs short.
  - Reader absorbs information easier
  - Academic writing may require lengthier paragraphs
- Avoid fluff words.
  - Qualifying words, such as very and little add little meaning.
  - Unnecessary words can be distracting and boring
- Don't ramble or repeat yourself.
  - Get to the point
  - Stay on topic
  - Do not say the same thing over merely to add content
- Edit. Edit. Edit.
  - Delete, rewrite, shorten
  - Set paper aside and return with fresh outlook...edit again
