Top Questions Transfer Students Ask......

When do I need to apply?

It can vary from school to school but generally if you plan to start in the fall, early admission is November the year before you start. Most financial aid and scholarship deadlines begin in February and March the semester before you begin.

What is transcript evaluation? What do I need? How long does it take?

Transcript evaluation is the process in which a student's new college determines which credits the student earned at their old institution will transfer and how. Students must send their official transcripts from all previously-attended colleges. Usually if a student transfers with 24 plus credit hours they will not need high school transcripts or ACT scores. Once the university receives the transcript it can take 2-3 week to get the evaluation back.

What kind of credits typically will not transfer?

Credits earned at unaccredited institutions, credits for remedial courses (fundamentals courses, for example) and credits for technical courses generally do not transfer.

Will my financial aid transfer?

Federal financial aid, like the Pell Grant, will apply to any accredited institution. Students receiving private scholarships should check with the granting organization to see if the funding will follow them to their new college. You will need to add the new school's federal code to your FAFSA.
